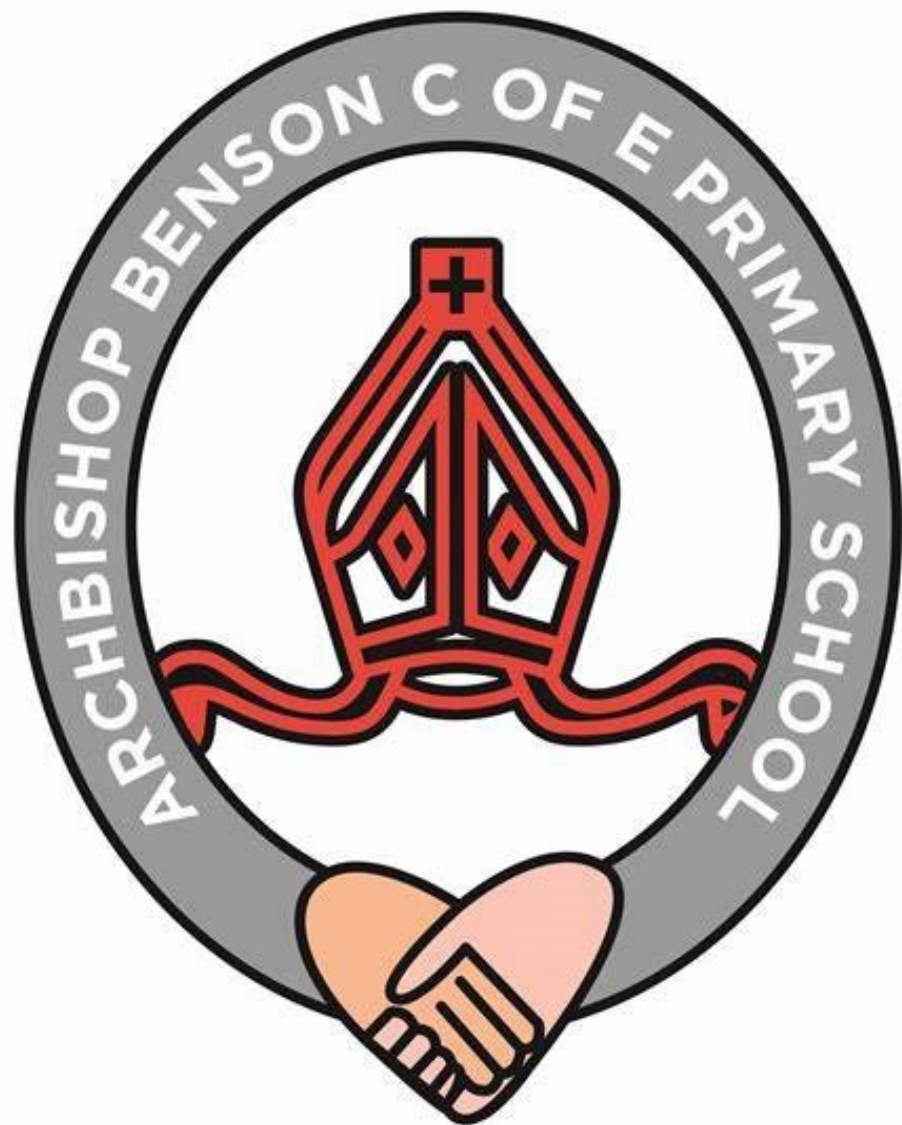

Ties



KS2 children are expected to wear school ties as a standard, daily item of uniform along with their shirt and jumper. We strongly advise children to have a spare tie at home. The school (generously funded by FABB) present all our Y3 children with a new tie as part of their transition into the Juniors.

Y6 Hoodies



The Y6 children will receive their hoodies for SATs week. After SATs are over, they will be allowed to wear their hoodies on the days that they have PE in school which is generally 2 days in the week. On the other 3 days, they will wear normal school uniform

Jewellery, Hair Ornaments, Make-up, Nail Varnish and Headscarves

No jewellery except small stud earrings. The exception to this rule are small objects of religious significance which will be agreed and monitored by the class teacher



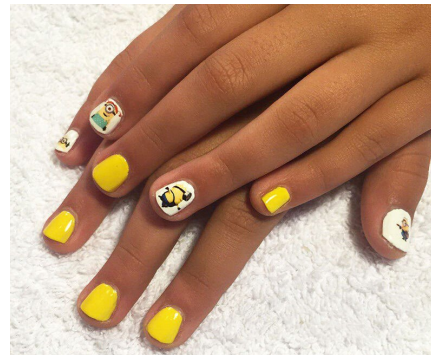
Pupils may also wear a watch (with no sound effects, cameras or games). Smartwatches are not allowed.



Pupils are free to wear a headscarf at Archbishop Benson if they wish to. These must be plain. Headscarves of the type which drape to shoulder length or just below are acceptable. Longer headscarves are not permitted for safety reasons.

Name stamp & ink pad

- The Standard Name Stamp costs £10, but it is reusable again and again. It is very easy to order your personalised stamp. Just add the name you require in the box, choose the font and size and add a symbol if required. Symbols make the label more personal but are also great for a child to spot their name quickly. You can have one or two lines of text.
- The Stamptastic Ink Pad costs £12 but it will stamp all of your uniform as well as bags, shoes, pencils and metal water bottles. The stamps have been tested and last for at least 50 washes, but of course if they do fade, you can just stamp them again. If you keep the ink in the special silver bag that it arrives in then it will last longer and should last at least two years.

Mobile phones for pupils



Permission to bring your phone to school

The school **can** give permission for a child to bring their mobile phone to school in Years 5 & 6 if they travel to and from school alone either at the end of the day or after a club.

To get this permission,

- both the child and the parent(s) must agree and sign that the child will abide by our policy on mobile phones and our Acceptable Internet Use agreement
- The child will be polite and sensible when handing in their phone and collecting it and remember that the reception area is a public place with parents and adults and we will want to show our best behaviour.

The school will authorise each request on an individual basis

School expectations

- We strongly discourage pupils from bringing phones to school, as there is a risk of phones being lost, damaged or used inappropriately in school. Parents can always get a message to pupils by calling the school office.
- If a pupil has a need to bring a phone to school, their parent must complete this permission slip and hand it to the class teacher.
- Parents & pupils must also read and sign the Pupil Mobile Phone Acceptable Use Agreement on the reverse of this permission slip.
- Pupils who bring a mobile phone to school must abide by the school's policy on the use of mobile phones, and its acceptable use agreement.
- The school reserves the right to revoke permission if a pupil does not abide by the policy.
- The school accepts no responsibility for mobile phones that are lost, damaged or stolen on the school premises. Please avoid sending valuable phones to school if at all possible.
- If a pupil is found to be using a phone on school premises, this is a serious matter and will be dealt with in accordance with the school's Behaviour Policy.

Whether at home or at school, please remember that mobile phones provide easy access to the internet which is full of fantastic opportunities but can also be a very risky place. It is important that we all work together to keep children safe. We strongly recommend that you enable parental controls on your child's phone, and talk to your child about how to stay safe online. Appendix 1: Acceptable use agreement for pupils allowed to bring their phones to school due to exceptional circumstances

Name of child: _____

You must obey the following rules if you bring your mobile phone to school:

- You must ensure that your phone is appropriately labelled and stored.
- Your phone must always be handed into the office at the start of the day to be stored securely.
- Your phone must be switched off before being handed into the office and must remain turned off at all times on school premises (including on the playground before and after school).
- You may not use your mobile phone in the toilets or changing rooms. This is to protect the privacy and welfare of other pupils and staff.
- You cannot take photos or recordings (either video or audio) of school staff or other pupils without their consent.
- Don't share your phone's password(s) or access code(s) with anyone else.
- Avoid sharing your contact details with people you don't know, and don't share other people's contact details without their consent.
- Don't use vulgar, obscene or derogatory language while on the phone or when using social media. Out of school online behaviour may need to be investigated by the school and this type of language is not permitted under the school's behaviour policy.
- Don't use your mobile phone to bully, intimidate or harass anyone. This includes via email, text/messaging app or social media. Rules on bullying, harassment and intimidation apply to how you use your mobile phone even when you aren't in school. Out of school online behaviour may need to be investigated by the school and this type of behaviour is not permitted under the school's behaviour policy.
- Don't use your phone to view or share anything that may be criminal e.g. sending or receiving inappropriate images or messages or other harmful content.
- You must comply with a request by a member of staff to switch off, or hand over, a phone. Refusal to comply is a breach of the school's behaviour policy and will be dealt with accordingly. Your permission to bring a phone to school may also be revoked.

Checking uniform

- When staff are **on duty outside in the morning** and are greeting children, we may remind a child if their shirt is not tucked in, if they are missing their school tie or if they are wearing incorrect footwear.
- Staff will remind children about uniform when they do **Meet & Greet** with the children at the start of the day. Each class will have a uniform poster on their class door and on their class recognition board which staff will use during the course of the day.
- **During the course of the day**, we will routinely remind children
 - to tuck their polo-shirts/ shirts tucked into their skirts, shorts or trousers
 - to tie back their hair
 - to put on their school tie
- Staff will have a **uniform card** on their lanyard and may show this visually to children (and have a quiet word) as another way of reminding them that their uniform is not complete
- Expected standards of uniform will also be reinforced by staff in our **weekly worship session**.
- Where lapses in uniform are more recurring, then staff will send a message initially to parents using an **Unexpected Uniform dojo point**. It could be that staff will **message parents via Class Dojo** instead of/as well as an Unexpected Uniform dojo point.
- There is an expectation that children will always be wearing correct school uniform and PE uniform. The school may decide to **contact parents at the start of the day** where a child is not wearing correct uniform and ask them to bring the missing uniform item into school that day.
- We are very keen to recognise high standards of school uniform and there will also be an **Expected Uniform Dojo point** (with 1 point)
