Who Do We Think We Are (WDWTWA)

As you know, every year we have a special Spiritual Moral Social and Cultural focus for the school. Last year it was "When I Grow Up....", this year our focus is on "Who Do We Think We Are?" (WDWTWA). We want our pupils to explore and celebrate our place within Cornwall, within Great Britain & within the world. We want to be loud & proud in celebrating our differences as well as recognising all that we have in common with people around the world. We also want to be inspired to be the very best that we can be both now and into the future

We launched our WDWTWA focus in the Autumn term when we all celebrated National Heroes Day on Friday, October 21st. In the Spring term, with St Piran's Day fast approaching, it makes sense for us to celebrate being Cornish or living in Cornwall. As you can imagine we have lots of lovely activities planned.

St Pirans Day Celebration - Friday 3rd March

The children will be celebrating St Piran's Day on Friday,March 3rd even though it actually falls on the Sunday this year. The children will be working collaboratively within their House Groups, so the children will be in family groups. Children should come to school in their normal school uniform. At registration time they will be given a coloured tee shirt by their teacher according to which house group they are in (same as sports day).

A team of staff have been busy this week coordinating the plans for the day and this is what they have revealed so far!

"Some of the activities will involve Cornish dancing, singing, history, geography, art work and a little bit of tasting! If your family are out & about this weekend, it would be wonderful if you could bring one pebble or stone to turn into a memento of the day {only one stone needed per family} If your child is the only family member at school at the moment, don't worry their team mates will help! Parents' Evenings

I know that the teachers are very much looking forward to seeing you next week for the Spring Parental consultations. Year on year, we have an excellent parental turnout. Last term 98%(!) of you met with your child's class teacher which is so wonderful – thank you!

Just to let you know that teachers and/or office staff will be trying next week to catch any parents who have not managed to make an appointment yet. Please don't take any offence if we do call you – it is just that that we care passionately about engaging with you and your child regarding their learning and development. All teachers feel that meeting with you at this mid-point in the year is so important to be able to celebrate your child's achievements and to work together on their next steps to achieving their full potential.

Since the government has changed the way children are being assessed, we have tried in advance of each parents' evening to share assessment information with you that hopefully helps to clarify the new national requirements in relation to age-related expectations. We think you are finding these letters useful because 94% of the parents who completed EoY parental surveys last year agreed that the school had done its best to provide you with information on your child's attainment against the new assessment arrangements. Mr Galler, our Assessment Coordinator, has put pen to paper again and in this week's newsletter is some further assessment information which will be good for you to read before you meet with your child's class teacher and which will hopefully negate the need to lose time on questions that we can answer in advance for you.

I would also like to make you aware that class teachers may discuss your child's attendance or punctuality with you briefly at your parental appointment. We certainly won't want to use the time to focus on either of these, but if your child's attendance rate is at 90% or below at

the current time and/or your child is coming to school late fairly regularly, then we will want to make you aware that this is a potential barrier to their learning.

We understand entirely and accept where a child has been sick or has had a medical condition issue that absence is unavoidable. Childhood illness is a fact of life, but some individual parents may not be aware how a combination of factors like illness and holidays has had a significant impact on their child's attendance and, therefore, on learning and progress.

I am available across the three afternoons/evenings if any parent would like to pop in and see me or would like to make an appointment to discuss anything with me

Volunteer helpers

The staff, pupils and I would like to say a MASSIVE thank you to our small army of volunteers who have completed the new Volunteer Application Process. This has been a huge task, but it is now up and running, meaning that the school can now recruit help where and when it is needed whilst also ensuring that all safeguarding requirements are being met. Many volunteers have been placed in areas across the school to assist in day-to-day activities, others are registered to help occasionally with off-site trips. These volunteers enable our children to take part in activities and events that would otherwise be impossible to manage.

Staff feedback with regards to our volunteers is overwhelmingly positive. One such example is Mrs Jo Williams, our SENCO, who also co-ordinates lots of swimming and running events in school. She wanted me to say a big thank you to the volunteers who have helped her so much on her trips out. She said."They are often my deputies on these trips and are always thinking one step ahead! Fab!!"

Now that we have the register in place, we will update it termly, so delays in approval are likely. This is due to the need for applicant to undergo induction sessions before starting as a volunteer. Our Volunteer Helpers' Policy and registration forms are available from the school office. If you would like to register to help with activities, in or out of school, please complete the forms and return them to the office marked for the attention of Mrs W Teasdale.

Once again, a big thank-you to all our volunteers for sharing their time and talents with us - we are so lucky!

You will have received a letter this week about our involvement in the SHEU health-related behaviours survey. Essentially it involves our Y4, 5 & 6 pupils completing a survey with questions relating to a wide range of health behaviours, for example:

Home and Family
Leisure and Money
Exercise
Relationships, emotional health & wellbeing
Healthy Eating
Tobacco, Alcohol, Drugs (Yr 6 only)

We just wanted to share with our Year 6 parents an example of the type of questions relating to *Tobacco, Alcohol, Drugs section*, just so you are aware in case this topic might pop up at home.

Please be assured these are very generalised questions and they are not being asked by the school because we think there is any issue within any child or family in Year 6. These SHEU questions are asked anonymously as this information, once processed, can be used as anonymised benchmark data in secondary schools and beyond.

Parents Evenings

Next week will give us the opportunity to meet with you again to celebrate your child's successes. As usual, their English, Maths and Cross Curricular books will be available outside of the classrooms for you to look whilst you are waiting for your timeslot - I'm sure you will agree that there have been lots of engaging topics covered so far this year.

As previously, the class teacher will provide you with a summary sheet that you can take away, detailing your child's baseline standards that they ended last year with, predicted end of year results for this year, targets to focus their current learning on and also any comments that relate specifically to your child's engagement with school or their specific needs.


The predicted end of year standards we will report to you have been colour coded as below:

Attainment Codes			
B (below)	Your child is not yet working from the current year-group's learning as they still need to secure learning from previous years.		
E (emerging)	Your child is just beginning to grasp a few of the elements from that year group's learning. They have secured less than half of the expected learning for that age group and don't necessarily always use it independently in their work.		
D (developing)	Your child has secured at least half of the learning from that year group and is applying it with increasing regularity and independence but there are still a few gaps that need to be addressed.		
S (secure)	Your child has secured EVERY aspect of learning from that year group and regularly uses it independently, mostly correctly.		

This chart will also be reproduced on the summary sheet as a reminder for you. What you will notice is that the letter codes typed over the colours are slightly different to those used previously – don't worry, we haven't changed the way we assess your children's work, we have just needed to give the same assessments slightly different names in order to tie in with our new online tracking system that will, when finalised, be able to provide you with more detailed information than ever before about your child's progress across their whole school journey. The principles of the new assessment system mean that from whatever starting point a child may have had from last y the idea is not to push them forward into higher year groups' work and rush them through the standards but to linger lo depth across lots of different contexts, thus achieving a **Secure** judgement this year.



Current and future Year 3 parents only may experience what appear to be anomalies in their results as a direct result of the contradictory nature of the assessment guidelines introduced by the government last year and which have been continued with this year. In essence, all pupils learn from and are assessed against the National Curriculum criteria for their age and ability, aiming to achieve a 'Secure' judgement for their year group. However, for Year 2, the government introduced an 'Interim Framework' last year. This means that last year's Year 2 children were taught from the National Curriculum but the government required us to assess them only against a more limited number of criteria and not the criteria as a whole (which is the case for other year groups). Naturally, this meant it was easier for last year's Year 2 pupils to achieve their standard and that was what we were required to report to parents. Coincidentally, this also produced more favourable results for the government to report nationally in the press following their changes to the system. However, now those pupils are in Year 3 the government expectation is that we revert to reporting against the whole of the National Curriculum, meaning that the required standard is harder to achieve and that the end of last year's results cannot be compared like-for-like with the end of this year's results. For some children it will not make any difference. For others who achieved well on the limited objectives last year, it may appear that they have made less or little progress this year, in numerical terms, due to the government's flawed tracking system and moving the goalposts. In reality you will see tremendous progress in their books and you must keep this in mind when celebrating their successes with them even if, on paper, the statistics look less promising. From what we currently understand, and do keep in mind that government policy rarely stands still for long, this will also be the picture for the current Year 2s next year and also the current Ye
